We aim to be recognised as a school of high standards, where students are eager and proud to attend, where parents want to send their children, where staff love to work and which the local and wider community values and supports.


Principal's Report



Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA)

Year 12 students must demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy before they can achieve their Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE). All students who have not achieved Band 8 or higher in Year 9 NAPLAN are required to sit OLNA in Year 10. The OLNA and Year 9 NAPLAN assessments determine the students who are eligible for a WACE.

The minimum standard for WACE encompasses skills that are considered essential for individuals to meet the demands of everyday life and work. It is this standard that the School Curriculum and Standards Authority (SCSA) report on in the Western Australian Statement of Student Achievement (WASSA) which students receive upon exiting Year 12.







School Surveys


