about the world.


KINDNESS: We value all people in our college community; this means treating each other with

### Success for All Students Year 12 Performance


It is acknowledged that Fremantle College has only been involved in the teaching of the 2020 Year 12 cohort for three years of their secondary schooling.

The Fremantle College community is proud to show such incredible improvement in its WACE result in one year. A school increasing 11% from 75%-87% is rare and a credit to all staff and students who have worked together to ensure that all students meet their course and qualification completion. This figure is above like schools (84%). Several strategies have contributed to this improvement; Pathways class and a team of dedicated teacher mentors, ongoing monitoring and tracking of student WACE progress, and increasing work ethic and attendance. The upper school year groups have also been focusing on a progress culture, goal setting and an orderly learning environment and this ongoing focus on high expectations has translated into results. More students are achieving attainment which means they are leaving Fremantle College with an ATAR of 55 higher, or a completed qualification; both positive pathways with destinations.

The college Median ATAR improved slightly as well, which was pleasing given the disturbances of COVID and the stress placed on ATAR students over the year. 82% of the ATAR cohort had university entrance approved prior to November 2020 and this was an excellent effort by all to ensure that in a year filled with uncertainty and concern, the group was still able to show marginal, improved ATAR performance. We still have some way to go to reach like school Median ATARs and this will be worked on again in 2021 through explicit planning and focus. Six students in 2020 are to be congratulated for winning SCSA Certificates of Merit, acknowledging their high, consistent effort over two years. Of these, half were ATAR and half were General students, demonstrating our support for all pathways as equal and important. Overall a fantastic year in the upper school space and one that all students, parents and teachers can be proud.

### Success for All Students **OLNA**

The Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment (OLNA) is a piece of data that is key to all students as it plays a part in the overall WACE achievement for the student and collectively for the college.


In 2020 we were pleased that notable improvements were made across three crucial measures:

- Overall achievement in Reading and Writing to 96% of WACE eligible students. This was an improvement of 5% and 10% respectively.
- Improvement in the measure used to indicate students who have met requirements of all assessments (increase from 81% to 87%)
- Improvement in the progress rate between students' achievement in Year 10 and final achievement in Year 12. This was well above state figures in all tests.

Our focus will continue to be in Numeracy in 2021 and be aimed at working with students in Pathways, dedicated OLNA groups and through the exploration of specific OLNA pathways in 2022. This pleasing progress is a testimony to all students who now understand the importance of OLNA and the significance of these assessments each year.





### Student Services Attendance

The relationship between absence from school and engagement and achievement across all cohorts strongly suggests that every day attendance at school contributes highly towards a student's learning capabilities and academic outcomes.

Building a positive college culture, promoting school attendance, monitoring absences, targeted intervention and supporting families are key elements to the gradual improvement in our attendance data thus far. The below strategies have helped with these improvements:

- Linking of our Good Standing Policy to attendance rates and reward activities.
- Improved communication with parents to reduced 'unauthorised' absences from college.
- Early identification of 'at risk' students and use of 'live tracking'.
- Specific classes set up for disengaged students.
- Targeting connectedness at the college. Introduction of positive programs, competitions, afternoon activities and rewards.

## Student Characteristic Funding Autism Extension Program

The Specialised Learning Program for Students with Autism Spectrum Disorder (SLP ASD) is now in its second year of operation at Fremantle College. The program is designed to support students with a diagnosis of ASD in Years 7-12 to achieve their academic potential in the mainstream secondary setting. Students eligible for this program have the academic capacity to participate and achieve success in mainstream schooling and beyond, although are at risk of underachieving or disengaging due to barriers with communication, behaviour and / or socio-emotional competency, preventing a full access to the curriculum. The Fremantle College SLP focuses on the achievement of positive academic, behavioural, social and emotional outcomes for each student to maximise independence and access to further education and successful employment.

In 2020, Fremantle College's SLP ASD again reached capacity with 18 enrolled students accessing specialised supports in Years 7 to 12. In 2020, students in the SLP ASD achieved:

- Regular attendance and /or improvement in attendance across all years;
- Positive peer engagement, with an increase in the frequency of students exiting the homeroom at break to socialise with mainstream peers;
- Strong emotional resilience and development of self-regulation through a sustained, quality socio-emotional program in the homeroom;
- Positive academic results; and
- Enhanced mainstream participation across a range of specialist programs and academies including:
  - Academic Excellence Academy
  - AFL Academy
  - Specialist Contemporary Music Program
  - Specialist Marine Studies Program
  - Specialist ICT Program

Students in the program have received countless College Values awards for Kindness, Enthusiasm for Learning, Curiosity, Leadership and Perseverance.

Students are consistently involved in the Fremantle College community, participating daily in the Breakfast Club and supporting student voice initiatives such as Book Week and College Year Book Committee. One SLP ASD student has been elected in as Student Councillor for 2021.

Family, student and staff feedback indicates that teachers working with students in the SLP ASD motivate students to learn, care about their students and are considered good teachers. Additionally, family feedback indicates that parents of students in the SLP ASD at this school can talk to teachers about their concerns and that staff in the SLP ASD consistently work with families to support student learning and that they would recommend the Fremantle College SLP ASD to others.

By the end of 2020, two students demonstrated the success criteria required to exit the program and have transitioned back into mainstream secondary education at Fremantle College full-time.



### Goods and Services Expenditure - Budget vs Actual


