Our School Community

This environment will enhance student motivation and engagement for life long learning through a sustainable school process that enables the setting of priorities and targets, promotes the strengthening of partnerships with the community, uses technology to enhance teaching and learning and directs professional development and dialogue for teachers.



SCHOOL OVERVIEW

Augusta Primary School is located in the beautiful seaside town of Augusta where the Indian and Southern Ocean meet, and the whales annually come to play. In this unique location we have a wealth of history and landmarks, featuring the Leeuwin Lighthouse; the tallest mainland lighthouse in the Southern Hemisphere. Augusta and the primary school have a strong sense of community where everybody works together to achieve and build success across a range of domains.

On entering the school grounds, you will be met by native bushland and lovely gardens. Enjoy strolling through our spacious school grounds. You will instantly see our modern and well-resourced Library thanks to kind donations from our local community and the amazing fundraising efforts of our P and C.

Then, as you continue, alongside the Kindergarten building, boasts our well -established nature play area for the students. We are spoilt to be surrounded by Native bushland and in a semi-cleared area, the students have the opportunity to return to nature where they can build, imagine and play as children. Crossing our oval you will notice our purpose built sustainable shed where students recycle and manufacture new materials.

The school prides itself with its strong sustainability focus equipping the students to be responsible for the future. We are also proud to be a Waterwise and Waste Wise school. We have a flourishing vegetable garden, just beyond the shed, where each student has the opportunity to become skilled in gardening, composting and worm farming. Connected to the garden is our school kitchen/canteen that allows the students to cook and create using the abundant organic produce.

As you continue through our school grounds, you will see how fortunate we are to have our very own Performing Arts Building, Science/ Art Room and Japanese Learning Centre. Despite our small size, all the students have the opportunity to innovate and imagine using the latest technology and advancements in Education. Throughout the school, you will come across a variety of areas which allow students to fully engage in both creative and structured outdoor and sporting activities. Students enjoy the physical challenge of a rope climber, and the dedicated junior and senior climbing equipment which are both protected by impressive shade structures.

Finally, you will enter our large undercover area. This is where we all come together and you will be welcomed to join in whole school and community functions. Student discos, open nights, performances and special events/ceremonies are regular features throughout the year in this area.




Academic Achievement

Each year student performance is monitored using a range of data. In 2020, no schools in Australia undertook the National Assessment Program in Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

TEACHER JUDGEMENT

The graphs below show the average grade allocation for English and Mathematics as reported by classroom teachers in Semester 2, 2020.





WHOLE SCHOOL ASSESSMENT

Each year the school uses standardised tests in Numeracy and Literacy to gather data across the school. In 2020, the school moved away from the conventional EasyMark standardised tests and administered PAT tests, which are being used by many WA primary schools.

As the tests are new to not only the students, but also the teaching staff, more time has been allocated to the collation and analysis of the data to ensure the information is reliable and valid to the context of this school.

At the time this report was published, the PAT Numeracy and Literacy student data was still being interrogated by the teaching staff and no whole school analysis had been performed.

STUDENT ATTENDANCE


The 2020 attendance rates are not available for publication as they were adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and are not comparable to previous years. At this stage, the Department of Education's decision whether 2020 attendance data will be released to schools is still pending.



ENROLMENT TREND

The following graph shows the Augusta enrolment trend for students in Pre-primary – Year 6, as reported in semester one, each year.

Enrolment Trend: 2016 - 2020



From 2015, Year 7 students were designated as secondary students and Lower Secondary includes Year 7 to Year 10 students. Small class sizes provide students with improved access to teachers and allow teachers to provide educational opportunities that are child centred and targeted.

YEAR 6 STUDENT DESTINATIONS

At the end of the 2020 school year there were 11 Year 6 students enrolled at the school. Of these, all 11 enrolled at Margaret River Senior High School at the commencement of 2021.



ATTITUDE, BEHAVIOUR, EFFORT

The following data has been derived from teacher judgements as reported to parents in Semester 2, 2020, for Years 3 - 6.

The positives:

- Participates responsibly in social and civic activities – 62% of the student population do this consistently;
- **Shows self respect and care** 59% of the students do this consistently; and
- Is enthusiastic about learning 62% of the students show this consistently.

Growth areas:

- Sets goals and works towards them with perseverance – only 24% of the students do this consistently
- Cooperates productively and builds positive relationships with others – only 38% of the student population do this consistently; and
- Shows courtesy and respect for the rights of others – only 38% of the students do this consistently.

Priorities

2020 PRIORITIES

Due to the unprecedented events of the 2020 school year, the release of the new Business Plan was delayed, prompting the next plan to be labelled 2021-2023.

The new Business Plan will outline and describe the school's actions and intent in relation to addressing future directions and working towards the school's vision.

To deliver these, a series of strategies and milestones will be implemented and monitored using a range of indicators. A detailed annual Operational Plan, outlining budget and school resource allocations, will complements the 2021-2023 Business Plan.

The strategies and milestones contained in the plan will indicate the level of progress towards achieving our three priorities:

- 1. English
- 2. Mathematics
- 3. Science

Curriculum support was increased throughout 2020 with the allocation of Education Assistant time in Literacy and Numeracy blocks to support teachers. In 2021, the school will continue the use of Education Assistants to support the 'small group model' across the school, allowing for explicit teaching of skills in ability groups.

In 2021, an area of priority for school planning will continue to be on ensuring all students meet at least the National Minimum Standard in Literacy and Numeracy.
