It gives me great pleasure to present the 2020 Annual Report for Miling Primary School. The Annual Report provides a snapshot of our school's achievements and directions over the 2020 school year. We are proud to be recognised as an Independent Public School (IPS), offering comprehensive and personalised education to our students.

2020 sees Miling PS come to the end of its Business Plan 2018-20. The plan has provided strategic direction to our school to achieve our priorities of: Curriculum, Culture and Community.

From the middle of term one our school was directly impacted by the procedures and safety regulations around the COVID 19 pandemic. Our school managed to navigate what was needed to keep students and staff safe, only reducing our school year from 40 weeks to 39 weeks, a great achievement for our school system.

Many events were cancelled due to COVID-19 and for the first time in a number of years' students were unable to sit the scheduled NAPLAN tests. Fortunately for our school and students, a number of events were able to still take place during the year such as the school Swimming Carnival, Faction Athletics Carnival, Book Week, NAIDOC Week, Bandanna Day and Pyjama Day. Without the professional commitment of a dedicated staff, partnerships with parents and the wider community, many wonderful learning opportunities and experiences would not happen.

Thank you to all of the parents for their ongoing support of our school and contributions to our students' programs. A special thank you to Kade Georgy, our School Board Chair, and our P&C President, Joey Seymour, and the members of both school organisations for their contributions throughout the year. I would also like to acknowledge the staff of Miling PS who have put a tremendous amount of energy and effort into every day in order to help our students achieve success.

Winners received a voucher to spend at the Book Fair. The Book Fair was a great success.

Students in Year 3-6 participated in the Woolworths T20 Blast Cricket Cup Carnival. They were joined by three other local schools; Watheroo, Kalannie and Dalwallinu on the Miling town oval. Book Week


